BASIC PROGRAM:

- Brief remarks by Marion County Clerk Beth White explaining the nuts and bolts of elections
- Students provided a ballot and asked to complete it
- Students cast their ballot on the actual voting machines used in Marion County elections
- Results revealed once the polls 'close' at your school.

EXTRA MATERIALS:

- **Voter registration forms:** Students who will be 18 on or before November 3 can participate in the Marion County special election. Registration deadline for this special election is Monday, Oct. 5!
- **Absentee ballot applications:** Application deadline is midnight, Monday, Oct. 26. Ballots must be returned no later than 6 p.m. Election Day.

OTHER IDEAS:

- **Ask your school's debate or political clubs to host a debate between the 'candidates.'** Ask students to research the candidates' positions and select one to represent each candidate on the ballot in a debate.
- **Invite campaign representatives** from the presidential campaigns to speak to the students.
- **Simulate the voting experience.** Hold a mock registration drive; create a poll book from the list of 'registered voters'; ask students to provide photo I.D. before being allowed to vote. Students can also serve as poll workers — 2 Clerks, 2 Judges and 1 Inspector.
- **Have your school's media department or newspaper conduct election coverage.** Leading up to the Y Vote program, ask your student journalists to interview the candidates or write an article about upcoming election deadlines.
